

Containers for mixed recycling in Rhode Island vary in color and size. If you're unsure of which container to use, ask your city or town's Department of Public Works, property owner, or property manager.

paper, cardboard (flattened) and cartons only

metal cans, lids and foil only

glass bottles and jars only

plastic containers only

empty at a minimum, rinsed whenever possible



Put these items in the trash as well, and your recycling will be SUPERB!



NO wet-strength paper or cardboard:

- fridge or freezer boxes (e.g. six-pack carriers, frozen pizza boxes)
- paper cups (e.g. coffee, soup)
- powdered detergent boxes
- kitty litter boxes
- parchment or wax paper
- NO sticker, contact, photo or carbon paper
- NO rigid cardboard tubes (i.e. those you can't flatten)
- NO paper pieces smaller than a 3" x 5" index card
- NO coated foil (e.g. yogurt lids, juice pouches, candy wrappers)
- NO plastic containers $\leq 2^{"}$ in diameter and height, or ≥ 5 gallons
- NO plastic containers that crinkle or tear (e.g. seedling trays)
- NO plastic containers that shatter or splinter (e.g. CD cases)
- NO plastic containers labeled "compostable" or "biodegradable"
- NO items made of equal amounts of different materials

(e.g. hangers)



- YES, keep recycling loose in bins/carts (i.e. not inside of bags)
- YES, flatten boxes and cut down pieces to $\leq 3' \times 5' \times 1'$
- YES, keep paper flat (i.e. don't bunch up into balls)
- YES, keep paper sheets intact (i.e. don't rip up into tiny pieces)
- YES, rinse containers whenever possible
- YES, scrape out as much peanut butter as you can
- YES, store containers like detergent upside down to empty fully
- YES, snip tail end off plastic tube containers to empty fully
- YES, put plastic tops back on plastic containers before recycling
- YES, take metal tops off of glass first, then recycle separately
- YES, keep containers shapely (i.e. don't crush flat)
- YES, bunch up clean aluminum foil to give it shape
- YES, keep broken glass out of recycling that's emptied by hand

DO NOT RECYCLE IN YOUR BIN OR CART



LEAF + YARD DEBRIS

You can compost leaf + yard debris at home: rirrc.org/compost. For pick-up, check on your city/town's collection schedule. Leaf + yard debris can be set out in paper lawn bags, but never in plastic bags.



HAZARDOUS WASTE

Look for words like hazardous poisonous, toxic, flammable, combustable, etc. Make an appointment to drop these items off at an Eco-Depot event: rirrc.org/ecodepot or 942-1430 x 241.



FOOD SCRAPS

You can compost food scraps (but no meat, dairy, or processed foods) at home too: rirrc.org/compost. If you do not compost at home, all food waste goes in the trash.

SHARPS

Place needles & lancets in a hard

Plastic container, seal, and label as "SHARPS," then either schedule an appointment for dropping the container off at an Eco-Depot event, or place the container in the trach

or place the container in the trash.



Take plastic bags + film that are clean, dry, at least somewhat see-through and at least somewhat pharmacy or big-box store in RI. Clingy food wrap is trash.



Check rirrc.org/meds for a local drop-off or separate medication from its bottle and ruin it by crushing pills and/or mixing pills + liquids with something like coffee grounds before placing in the trash.



Take any dry, odorless textile (even torn, stained, or non-apparel items like sheets) to any "clothing" bin in RI. There is a bin at RIRRC too. No rugs, carpeting, or rags covered in hazardous waste (e.g. motor oil).



Check with your city/town for a local collection. RIRRC accepts TVs, computers, and computer plug-ins (e.g. mouse) in the state program: rirrc.org/ewaste. Your local program may take "anything with a plug."



Save scrap metal for an occasional trip to a drop-off center. Check with your city/town for a local option. You can also bring it to a private metal recycler where you may be paid for it: goo.gl/maps/5d70O



BULKY WASTE

Check with your city/town for a local collection of bulky plastics, tires, mattresses, appliances, etc You can also take these to RIRRC (fees may apply): rirrc.org/dropoff



FOAM

Check with your city/town for a local collection, or hire a waste removal company. You can also bring it to RIRRC directly, for a fee: rirrc.org/dropoff.



HARDCOVER BOOKS

+ MEDIA

Take donatable books, CDs, DVDs, and VHS tapes to any "book" donation bin in the state, such as Discover Books. There is a bin at RIRRC too: rirrc.org/dropoff

HYBRIDS

Items made up of equal amounts of different materials or 3+ different materials cannot be recycled. Find special programs at terracycle.net or place in the trash



COOKING OIL

Fats, oils, and grease should never go down the drain. Cooking oil (vegetable, corn, olive) can be dropped off for conversion into biofuel. Check with your city/town or take to RIRRC: rirrc.org/dropoff.
